Walnut Creek General Plan Update Show of Support, Kaiser, Broadway Plaza

Thank you for your support in showing the City of Walnut Creek that the Parkmead community cares about the impact of development in the area near us and the anticipated increase in traffic on Newell and Lilac. We turned in a petition signed by more than 500 neighbors and 70 to 80 of us (standing room only) showed up on September 22 at the Planning Commission meeting as 17 or 18 neighbors spoke. The first 8 speakers covered specific points raised in our petition while others gave personal testimony to their concerns as residents of Parkmead. Friends of the Creeks and involved property owners also spoke. The City definitely knows we exist and care. Several commissioners and staff commented that it was one of the best-attended meetings on the General Plan so far and they were impressed with our organization and passion.

As in any political process there are many interpretations of how we did and whether anything will come of our efforts. It will take continued vigilance and participation in the process to make sure we are heard. The specific results of the meeting are being drafted and will be shared with us soon. Basically, we asked for height and Floor Area Ratio (FAR) limits in the entire Land Use Change Area #3 (area between Botelho, S Main, Newell and I-680) while the draft general plan had called for increases. The Planning Commission reached consensus to not change the height limits and Floor Area Ratios (FAR) in "Block A," the plot of land west of California Blvd – i.e. the Kaiser surface parking lot on Newell near the entrance to our community and the block including Pinky's. We are especially in need of candidates in District 5 and 7 (see map) and some at-large reps. Some board members are "retiring" - so we need some new folks to get involved.

consider this compromise a victory in that many things in the General Plan tend to get approved as found in the draft. They did, however, agree to the proposed increases in “Block B,” the plot of land east of California Blvd. – i.e. the Albertson’s block across from Kaiser. Most importantly, they approved text to “add consideration of: view preservation and visual corridors, determine traffic modifications that could help traffic mitigation on Parkmead neighborhood, building envelopes, circulation plan, bike safety and access.” In addition they agreed to consider creek goals and land use regulations for Block A (west block) that help meet these goals. And finally they agreed to our proposal for a Specific Plan for Land Use Change Area #3, which means there will be more detail available for review and more public input from neighbors. These plans need city funding, not always an easy task but one we will pursue.

Our Development Committee and Board will monitor upcoming city meetings. Our Traffic Committee has already begun discussions with city staff on suggestions made in the petition and at the September meeting concerning traffic mitigation on Newell between California and I-680. Once the Planning Commission approves its version of the draft General Plan, it will go to the City Council in early 2006. We may need to return to a City Council meeting then to keep an eye on areas of concern to Parkmead and be ready to speak out one more time.

Kaiser: Several planning commissioners urged us to be in communication with Kaiser since they own a big chunk of the property on Newell between California and I-680 and would not mind owning more. They informed us that they have no immediate plans for building expansion (except remodeling the old Emergency Room on S. Main) but they definitely need more parking. The surface lot on Newell and the old office building behind the gas station on Newell are prime areas for that.

Broadway Plaza Shopping Center: As you may know, the expansion of this shopping area was initially part of the General Plan but was removed. They invited the PCA Board to have a representative at a forum they hosted on October 25 to explain their plans and seek our input as a concerned neighbor. Currently they own 24 acres including 9 acres for parking lots. While there are no definite plans yet for the shopping center, they are interested in expanding to include a third anchor store plus 30 to 40 small stores. The new anchor store would go at the corner on Broadway and Newell on the site of the two level parking garage and more stores would be added on the garage site. Some parking would be underground, but limited by the creeks under the area, and more would be added as a level on top of the new small stores. They are currently limited by Measure A height limits to 40’ to 50’ where the parking lot is now. They currently have 700,000 square feet of building space and want to increase that by 50% or about 350,000 more square feet. The current Macy’s Men’s store will also be redeveloped. Concerns over traffic were most prominent along with pedestrian friendly space and keeping view corridors open. They were open to suggestions, and one was to close the street in Broadway Plaza to traffic. More detailed plans will be available in early 2006 and there will be public hearings, which the PCA Board and committees will monitor and keep you informed.

Bolstered by the excellent attendance of concerned residents at the September Walnut Creek Planning Commission hearing on the 2025 General Plan update, members of the committee will be meeting with traffic engineers at the city and getting the county involved to create a better street environment for all of us.

Trekking Tuesdays and Walking Wednesdays

(You are welcome to join in walking the neighborhood on Tuesdays – or any other day.) You can also help the kids who walk and cycle to school by trying not to block the narrow sidewalks with wheeled-bins, if you can avoid it. And please try not to park on the Lilac and Newell pathways, especially during school hours.

511.org has given us some flashing reflector lights to hand out to anyone who likes to walk the neighborhood in the twilight hours and wants to be safe.

On the first day of Walk-Bike to School Week in early October, there was a big turnout of participants and we were joined by State Senator Tom Torlakson and Walnut Creek Mayor Gary Skrel and covered by Channel 2 News. Thanks to Tony for organizing this event again and for the volunteers who assisted and continue to do so.

News for Neighbors

The Parkmead Community Association occasionally seeks to inform residents of new or changing city and county regulations or to clarify existing ones. Our mission per our bylaws is to “provide an organization to represent the area before governmental bodies and to encourage activity by residents interested in furthering the peace, health, safety, quality of life, and environment in the Parkmead Community Area.” In the case of city and county “rules”, we seek to educate, not regulate – we do not enforce. We encourage neighbors to discuss issues such as remodels, fences, trees, parking, etc. – all in the hope of resolving potential conflicts. Nobody wants to be surprised by an enlarged house or a cut tree next door, nor do we want tensions over our neighbor’s actions (or inactions) to fester. Parkmead Tree Maintenance

Parkmead trees increase property values, improve air quality, provide shade during summer months, significantly reduce noise and air pollution, enhance natural beauty, and provide wildlife habitat. Preservation of our neighborhood park-like setting requires regular tree inspection/maintenance. Properly maintained trees are less likely to become infested with insects and disease, throw branches, fall down, and/or cause property damage during winter storms. Prevention is often considerably less expensive than cleaning up after storm damage.

Most tree service companies with licensed arborists provide free consultation, expertise, recommendations, and cost estimates by appointment. Fall is a good time to schedule tree work in preparation for winter. Tree maintenance and/or removal should be avoided during the bird-nesting season (March, April, May, and early June).

A permit is required prior to removal of most trees in the city and county. Trees can be monitored using satellite imagery and removals are easily identified by parcel number. Cutting down a tree without a permit may result in a fine. In addition, some trees have protected status in both the city and the county. Building a structure or installing an impermeable surface within the drip line of a tree without a permit may also result in a fine.

The City of Walnut Creek requires a permit for removal of trees nine inches in diameter or 28 inches in circumference or larger when measured at 4-1/2 feet above the natural grade. Property owners within the city can request a permit at 925-943-5834 and there is no charge. Contra Costa County requires a permit for removal of trees six inches in diameter or 20 inches in circumference or larger when measured at four feet above the natural grade. Property owners within the county can request a tree permit package be sent to their home by calling 925-335-1360.

PCA E-Mail List

The PCA Board has established an e-mail list of neighbors who want to be informed on events and issues of interest to the neighborhood. This is an attempt to improve communications during the months between our three newsletters. There will be no commercial or political use of your e-mail address, no attached files, and no sharing of the list. We do not expect more than one posting a month. Storage Guidance — RVs, Boats, Trailers

Contra Costa County recently updated its ordinance on boats, RVs, and trailers as to proper storage on one’s property. With this in mind, we wanted to make neighbors aware of the new rules and remind folks of the Walnut Creek rules. Basically, the intent is to establish how these vehicles must be stored out of sight and/or how long they can be kept in public view.

Contra Costa County Ordinance Code Section 84-68.1404 states that “The storage in any land use district of a mobile home, travel trailer, camp car, vessel, or vessel trailer at the residence of the owner or any other residence is permitted when not used for living or sleeping purposes; provided, that the mobile home, travel trailer, camp car, vessel, or vessel trailer shall be adequately screened from view from public roadway or thoroughfare”. The updated County ordinance (as of 7/05) “requires 90% of the massing of the vehicle being screened either through the utilization of landscaping, fencing, or intervening building mass, would provide adequate screening for today’s modern vehicles”. This replaces the old rule of a six-foot fence with 90% coverage.

Walnut Creek City Municipal Code Sec. 10-2.3.111. “Motor Homes, Trailers, Boats, Buses and Campers” covers homes in the City and states such vehicles may not “be parked or stored within any required front or street side yard in any residential district” except for loading and unloading (24 hours) or accommodating visitors who are traveling (for one week) nor may they be used for living in except for traveling visitors.

Hillside Covenant Church Newsletter

By now you may have received a newsletter produced by Hillside Covenant Church identified as a “Parkmead community newsletter.” As stated in their first issue: “We are pleased to introduce this newsletter as a new resource for the Parkmead vicinity. It complements, not replaces, the periodic newsletter distributed by the Parkmead Community Association and includes information provided by this organization. The distribution area of this newsletter is larger and includes the administrative staff of Parkmead Elementary.” The Parkmead Community Association Board was consulted by the church prior to the newsletter being produced.
